


When Paul asked me if I would like to write something for the club newsletter, my first thought was "what on earth can I tell these people about photography?" So rather than anything technical, I will tell you about my photographic journey with MGPS and what I have learned so far.

I'd had my eye on MGPS for quite a few years, but it wasn't until 2019, that I found the time to join. My youngest son Marcus was born with severe cerebral palsy, and as a single working Mum, pretty much all of my spare time was spent looking after Marcus, while also trying to do my best for his older brother. Marcus had complex medical needs and it wasn't until the introduction of the NDIS that I could pay for a suitably qualified carer to spend time with Marcus to give me a break. For the first time in fourteen years,

I could start a new interest - Photography. I joined the MGPS beginner group and was instantly hooked.

Beginner lessons with Julie Geldard and Suzanne Edgeworth were а perfect introduction to the basics of operating my new little Olympus OMD EM10 and the kit lenses that came with it. I was so impressed with the presentation nights. and thoroughly intimidated by the competition nights. I was lucky enough to be graded into AB grade and eventually found the courage to enter the competitions. It was a slow start, but I gained my first Honour Award towards the end of 2019, for a photo taken during one of our beginner lessons ("Ampersand").

For two years most of my photos were taken around home, my local neighborhood, or further afield around Brisbane. Marcus was my constant companion. I would load him into his

wheelchair, collect all his medications and feeding gear, grab my camera, and off we would go on one of our

little photography expeditions together. Marcus loved to be outside and moving, which was great, but if I ever stopped pushing his wheelchair for too long, he would let me know about it. When out with Marcus, my photography technique was in the style of point, shoot, and run. One club member told me that if my first photo was my best, I was doing something wrong. I think my early days photographing with Marcus caused me to have this problem, which I continue to this day. Looking on the positive side, however, the restriction of staying local meant that I was pushed to find all the special things that were in plain sight, which I think is good practice for a beginner. The way looking through a viewfinder changes how you see the world is one of the beautiful things about photography.

In February 2021, my world came crashing down when Marcus died suddenly at the age of 16. My photo buddy was gone, and although I now had all the time in the world to get the best shot, I felt nothing but sadness when taking photos without him. Three years down the track, I still struggle with this, however, I am slowly finding ways to enjoy photography again.

I love photos of people, and through friends who are also parents of disabled children, I have had the opportunity to photograph some special events. These include dances for



teenagers and young adults, who due to their complex disabilities, would otherwise not have the chance to get out and socialise at music events. I find this photography challenging as it's usually in a room with dim lighting, and I can't use a flash because many participants have epilepsy. I also think using the flash would be very distracting, and I try to be as inconspicuous as possible. Last year I received my first image of the night with a photo taken at one of these events ("Let's Dance").


In February 2022, I went on a solo trip to Tasmania. I bought myself a new wide-angle lens and travelled light. Staying at Airbnbs I hired a car and drove from

I stayed at a wombat rescue Airbnb and got to cuddle a baby wombat. It was so amazing to finally have new places to photograph. I only had a week but could have kept going for months.


Other styles of photos that I include botanical love images, and this is an area that I would like to spend more time working on. I am always collecting sticks and leaves during my bushwalks around Toohey Forrest. I also have learnt that simplicity in photography works best for me. Although I love images that have lots of complexity, I think this takes a lot of skill. Monochrome is also an area I would like to develop and I would love to



try infrared photography one day. Time is my biggest problem. Full-time work and part-time university study means

that I have not been able to spend as much time practicing my photography as I would like, but I am hanging in there. I particularly appreciate the set subject category of the club competitions, as they force me to pick up my camera and think about my photography.

What else do I love about being a member of MGPS? I think it's the inspiration that I get from being with a group of people who are so engaged in doing something they

love.
Photography is such an amazing pastime (or profession). It's art, science, and technology all rolled into one.



It's an excuse to get outside and explore, or something to do on a rainy day, staying inside to Photoshop, or taking still lifes. Travelling to exotic locations or crawling around your backyard looking for bugs. Photography is an opportunity for creativity and continuous learning, that I hope to continue for the rest of my life.



I thank Trudi Aykens for her very touching article about her photographic journey since joining MGPS. Trudi's story really fulfills the exact purpose of *Exposure's* feature articles: to assist members to know more about one another and to explore how members create meaning through their photography.

Honours from June - People

Mekong skipper by Paul Mackay

I was visiting Pak Ou Caves, an hour north of Luang Prabang in Laos. To reach the caves we took a motorised canoe across the Mekong River. My wife and I were the only passengers and the canoe rocked quite a bit, so I was hesitant to attempt to turn around to photograph the skipper for fear of unbalancing the craft. Instead, I figured out the likely settings, used the widest angle of my lens, set focus for the lower middle and held the camera over my shoulder photographing backward on bust mode just guessing what I might capture. I was delighted with one of the images. The skipper is drinking a caffeine beverage.

Olympus OMD EM 1 Mk III with 12-40 Zuko Pro lens at 12 mm with UV filter. ISO 320, f9, 1/160 sec.

I substantially increased contrast and darkened the sky in Photoshop.





Striving for Australia by Rose Parr

Being a tennis tragic, I attended the Billy Jean Cup at the Qld Tennis Centre Tennyson in April this year. Knowing the arena's layout, I chose my seat from the seating map when booking online. A restriction regarding spectator photography at this venue limits lens size to 200mm, so I used this occasion to try out my new 70-200mm lens. I found this an adequate size (if you're not after extreme close-ups) as you need a wide shot anyway when anticipating the players' moves, and the cropping in processing was reasonable. Since there is a roof over the arena, the light wasn't great and I was avoiding a high ISO but was pleasantly surprised when the shots looked OK with my settings. I composed most shots to avoid a cluttered background. I intend to experiment further with settings and compositions at the

Brisbane International early 2025.

I watched the two matches in the session through a viewfinder. I feel that's real dedication to my photography journey.

Edited in Adobe Lightroom Classic.

Sony A7Riii camera body, Sony FE 70-200 F2.8 lens at 86mm. Aperture Priority. 1/1600 second, F2.8, ISO 500. Handheld. Continuous focus, burst mode.

Jubilation by John Langer

Suncorp Stadium (Lang Park) was the venue on Saturday 12 August 2023 for a Matilda's football (soccer) match that will be remembered for many years. Featuring Australia against a very competitive French outfit, this World Cup Quarter-final game was to be decided in a dramatic penalty shootout. When Cortnee Vine struck the penalty that led to Australia's 7-6 victory, it was wonderful to witness first-hand the celebrations that followed. Fortunately, our front row seats allowed us to see up-close the jubilation of the Matildas as they then walked around the stadium. It also provided an opportunity for me to capture a relatively successful, low resolution image with an Apple iPhone (unfortunately, most sports stadiums restrict the use of a DSLR camera with a long lens). My final image was produced after adjustments in Lightroom, especially to the texture, clarity and light (by reducing shadows),

Flowing hair by Bruce McDonald

Captured in a studio with a cyclorama allowed for a seamless background on this model shoot. A large octo-box softbox was the single light source used throughout the shoot. A model with experience in dance and photographic modelling provided the subject. As she stood head and hair forward, she then threw her head back as she stepped forward and up to produce this pose. This was about the 15th attempt to get the hair extended behind the model.

The image was processed in *Lightroom Classic* using the Adobe Portrait profile with Basic panel adjustments including contrast, highlights, whites, shadows and blacks along with small adjustments to the clarity and vibrance. Sharpening and noise reduction were applied before adding a vignette. The colour image was then converted to black and white.

Capture: Canon R5 with RF 70-200 f/2.8 IS L lens @ 70mm, f8, 1/200 sec ISO 200. Manual mode was used.

Capture: Canon Eos R5, f/9; 1/100s; ISO 320. Lens at 100mm. Manual.

The photo was taken in the Queen Street Mall in February. A few of us were out doing some street photography, I turned around and this lady was walking towards us. The topic of people was due shortly so I took this shot as the lady looked interesting.

Olympus E-M5III, lens M.12-100mm F4.0, 1/60 sec, f/8, ISO 500, Aperture priority, Spot Metering, Focal length 14mm (28mm)





and Photoshop for Levels & Curves.

Canon R5 f5.6 Exposure1/160 ISO 100
