Location Guide – Rosewood Old Trains

There is just something about old trains that attracts us photographers. Maybe it is that sense of power that still radiates from the train or wonderful rusty texture that can be found on the various metal parts. A small town located about 60kms west of Brisbane, Rosewood certainly has a bit to offer the photography in the form of old railway items.



Rosewood is a pretty little town, about an 1hrs drive from the heart of Brisbane in Queensland and has a long history of rail industry with branch lines built to connect coal mines in the area. These mines were connected to the main Brisbane – Toowoomba line.

The town celebrates this history through the local *“Rosewood Railway Museum”* which is open every Sunday, you can even take steam train rides around the area.

When exploring this area, there is a very wide range of images you can look for. There is the obvious images around the beautiful majesty trains, those running restored models and those slowly rusty away in the fields. You should also look for textures and tones that can be found in close up detail, rusty metal for example offers great opportunities.

SPECIAL PHOTOGRAPHIC FEATURES
Rosewood Railway Museum – If you are in town on a Sunday this is a great place to start your train photography adventure. With an old station and quite a number of carriages this museum will keep you occupied for quite a longer period of time.



Old Rail yards – Very nearby to the museum is quite a number of old trains and carriages that are parked on sidings right next to

the road. I guess these old carriages are here awaiting restoration, they certainly make subject for your photography. Just be careful around the long grass and the

uneven ground, these can be a bit tough on the ankles.

Cabanda Train Station – Located about 5 mins drive from the museum is this wonderfully restored station makes a very unique subject. I found it great for sunset photography.



Rosewood Train Station – This active station is located in the heart of the Rosewood township. The station is an attractive and unusual building that was constructed in 1918

BEST TIME OF DAY

As with most outdoor photography, I recommend making use of the golden hours of sunset and sunrise to get the best lighting for your images. The middle of the day can be very hot around the rusty metal monsters, so bring plenty of water. If the day is overcast then I tend to look for more detailed images looking at textures or patterns in the rusty metal.

GETTING THERE

Head west from Brisbane on the M5 freeway.

Take exit **Ipswich Motorway** on the right to merge onto **M7** towards **Ipswich/Toowoomba**

Continue onto **M2**

Continue onto **National Highway A15** (signs for **Warwick/National Highway 15**)

Slight right onto **Ipswich-Rosewood Rd/ State Route 93**

Continue to follow Ipswich-Rosewood Rd

Turn right onto **School St**

Continue onto **John St** and you will be in Rosewood

CONCLUSION

It is often the little known locations that can yield the most surprising pictures. Even if you are not a railway history buff, you will find many interesting items to photography in these locations. Beside the sweeping vistas and the majestic old trains slowly rusting away in the paddocks, you can find great texture and macros shots by looking closer at subjects.

Q: Do I have to attend all of the outings?

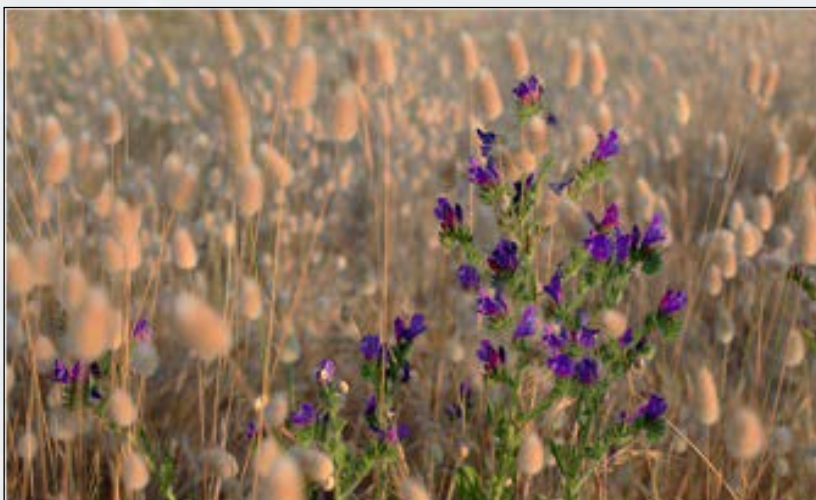
No, but it would be good if you had an interest in the activities that you arrange.

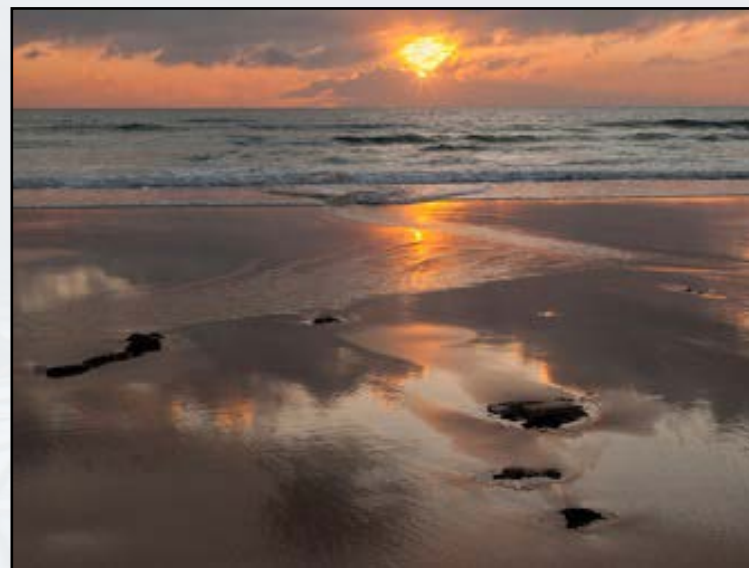


BACKGROUND

I refer to myself these days as an 'occasional' photographer

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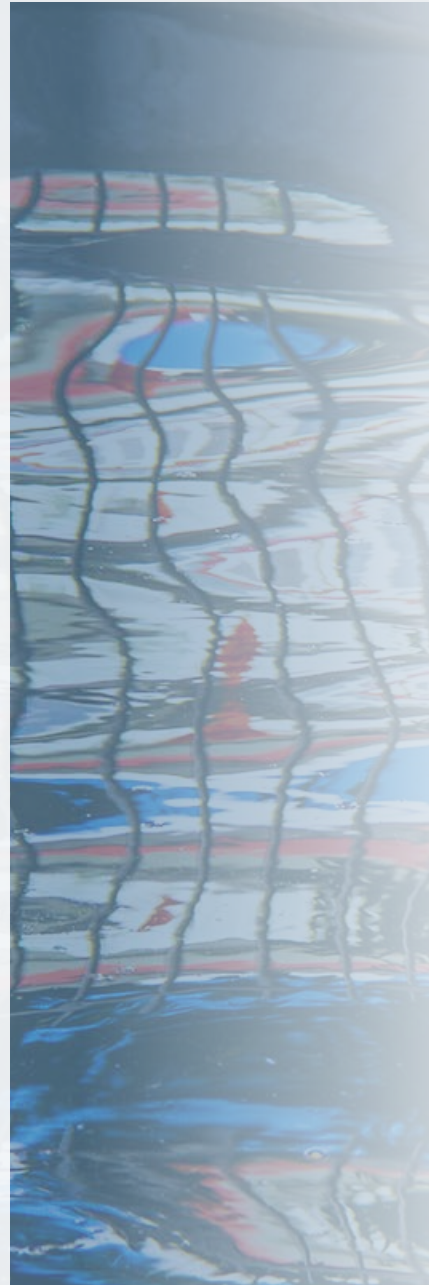
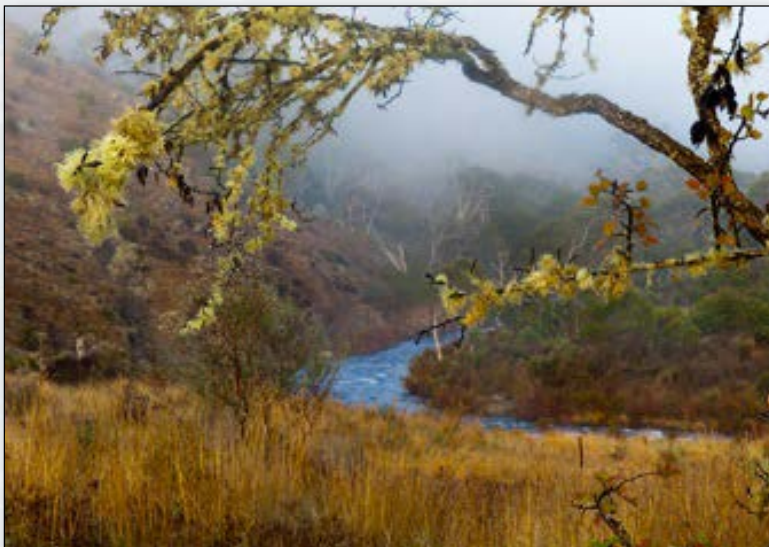

How to See in Black and White

HOW TO SEE IN BLACK AND WHITE

In my previous article I showed you [how to convert colour photos to black and white in Lightroom](#). However, no matter which technique you use, good monochrome photography starts in your mind. If you can learn to see in black and white, you can create beautiful monochrome images. Here are some tips to get you started.

UNDERSTAND THE APPEAL OF BLACK AND WHITE

Colour photography is very literal. It depicts the world as it really is. Black and white, on the other hand, gives us a new way of seeing. Removing colour takes us a step away from reality and towards creating an artistic interpretation. Shape, form, tone and texture are revealed to the eye, rather than overpowered by colour.

But the appeal of black and white photography goes deeper than that. The monochrome image, at its best, is beautiful. It's art. It captures the beauty and soul of the subject. It moves people. It's powerful and it endures.

LEARN TO SEE TONAL CONTRAST

Tonal contrast happens when there is a clear difference in brightness between your subject and the background. Here are two examples.



The photo on the left shows a white sticker pasted on a door. There is tonal contrast between the light and dark tones. In this image you find a light tone (the sticker) surrounded by dark tones (the door), a type of tonal contrast that works very effectively in Black and White.

The photo on the right shows a dark statue against a near white background. This is the opposite type of tonal contrast, where a dark toned subject is shown against a light background.

Tonal contrast is the basis of many successful black and white photos. Images that make good use of tonal contrast convert to monochrome with little effort. Let's take a look at a couple of practical examples.



In this portrait I positioned the model against a dark background to take advantage of the difference in brightness between the light falling on her and the light falling on the trees behind her (which were in shade). If you want to create powerful black and white portraits, this style will serve you well.



Here I took advantage of the difference in brightness between the twigs in the home-made broom and the dark stones. You can see the same principle in action as in the portrait, a light toned subject against a dark toned background. I knew this would make a strong black and white image because it contains two things that look good in monochrome: texture and tonal contrast.

SIMPLICITY AND NEGATIVE SPACE

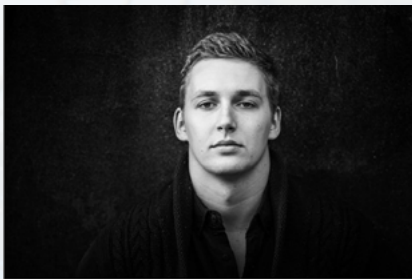
All the photos I've shown you so far have two more things in common. One is that the *composition is very simple*. I've deliberately moved in close to the subject and framed it in such a way to eliminate distracting elements. An added benefit is that the tonal contrast becomes much stronger when the composition is simplified.



I moved in close to crop everything but the vendor's hand and the Chairman

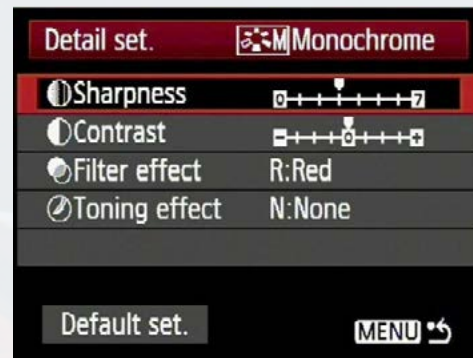
Mao pocket watch in this photo taken in an antique market in Shanghai. The simple composition emphasises the texture of the watch and hand as well as the difference in brightness between them and the background.

Negative space is the area surrounding your subject. It is negative space if it doesn't contain much detail. In black and white, it would be an area of white, black or grey that creates a kind of frame for your subject, giving it room to breathe within the composition.



This portrait is a good example of using negative space. The model's face (a light tone) is surrounded by an area of dark space that contains just enough detail for you to see what it is (his shirt and the wall behind him). In this portrait you can see the principles of tonal contrast, negative space and simplicity of composition working in harmony together.

So far we've looked at some of the elements that contribute to strong Black and White images, but that may not be a great help when you're faced with a colourful subject and the colours are so strong that you can't visualize how it will turn out in Black and White. Don't worry if this happens to you – it takes time and practise to learn to see in monochrome.

One thing you can do to help you visualize the subject in Black and White is switch to your camera's monochrome mode. The key is to select the Raw format, so that the image is recorded in full 12 or 14 bit colour (essential for good Black and White conversions).

But when you play back your images on the camera's LCD screen, they will be presented in Black and White. If you have a camera with an electronic viewfinder it may even display the scene in black and white as you look through it. This helps you see how the colours in the scene translate to the grey tones that make up a monochrome image. If the image is a little flat, which will happen if you're not

shooting in bright sunlight, increase the contrast to add some pop.

Thai Story

In November, following in the footsteps of Ann and Gordon and many others, and with several other Club members, I went on Julie Geldard's 12 day tour (aka experience, extravaganza) to northern Thailand, and would like to tell you something about it.

In summary, the tour was wonderful. We were introduced to a wide range of Thai peoples, cultures, performances, landscapes, nature, cuisine and experiences. Photo opportunities abounded at every turn. Julie provided expert advice on how best to take advantage of each type of opportunity. The twin share guesthouse accommodation (in 4 different locations) was simple, clean, well-equipped and most importantly had free wifi. The food at local cafes and restaurants was wonderful, as you'd expect in Thailand, including the cafe where we sat on platforms above a raging river. (But I still struggle to understand those of my fellow travellers who refused or were unable to eat spicy food—what a loss!) The price of the tour was very modest for what was provided, specially in comparison with most other photography tours.

The tour was timed to start during the Loy Krathong (*) lantern festival, during which members of the public gather throughout the city but specially near our first guesthouse to launch lanterns (small orange hot air balloons) which fill the sky, to launch floating candles on the river, to participate in and watch parades, to enjoy fireworks, to eat, and generally to party. This lasts several days... or nights... and is a special experience.

Thailand is a buddhist country and there are temples on every corner. The temples serve as places of worship, community centres and schools. Many young men serve as monks for one or two years and then return to normal life. So you see them buying cameras and iPhones in stores and generally taking an interest in consumer as well as spiritual things. Our local guide and driver Ravi Fong used his local contacts to find out when interesting events were occurring such as the inauguration of a new temple and the mass launch of larger lanterns by school children. The temple at Doi Suthep was particularly interesting and busy (despite the rain we had that day, and only that day). At the Silver Temple, monks were working silver. At another temple, monks were making lanterns.

Although there are modern supermarkets in the (outer) suburbs of Chiang Mai, we stayed in the centre where almost all shopping is done in bustling indoor and outdoor markets. It was interesting to see the wide variety of foodstuffs that were being sold. E.g., there was some dispute about whether the frogs were being sold for food or for good luck. We saw monks collecting daily alms outside the markets. Some of us bought a lot of cheap goods at the markets, and cheap camera accessories in the electronic stores, though avoiding cheap quality was a challenge.

We were taken to a Hmong (a northern hill tribe) village outside Chiang Mai, introduced to the Mayor and a couple of local residents, given a home-cooked meal, and entertained by the local children. It's a bit hard to know what to make of this visit. The homes were certainly simple, but most had



electricity and TV sets and so on. The children were genuinely excited by our visit but took a bus daily to a nearby school.

We spent several days outside Chiang Mai. I thought the highlight was driving along a good 2-lane road to the summit of Doi Inthanon, the tallest mountain in Thailand, and taller than Mt Kosciusko, in order to photograph sunrise over the clouds below summit. Tricky photography challenge, even using bracketing. Immediately afterwards we visited the summit temple (whose name I can't find right now) for more cloud photography, and walked the beautiful 3km Kew Mae Pan Nature Trail near the summit (which some of my fellow travellers found a challenge but still succeeded).

We visited the beautiful Queen Sirikit Botanic Gardens to practice flower and macro photography (where I gained confidence at focus stacking), the orchid farm, the Thai Insect Zoo (to practise butterfly and insect photography, Tiger Kingdom (to pat and photograph baby and adult tigers, though I think this stop should be omitted from future tours because it's ethically dubious), and the Elephant Nature Park (Gordon's

favourite location, where mistreated elephants from the logging, tourist and begging trades are rehabilitated). We also visited silk, silver, jade and umbrella factories.

We took a Thai cooking class from the famous Pom and produced beautiful dishes, but whether the knowledge I gained sticks will be another story. Some of us went to the famous Chiang Mai ladyboy cabaret!

The pace was mostly leisurely with opportunities to rest and recover (e.g., from the heat) on most days. Julie, Suzanne and Ravi ensured that everything went smoothly. I made some new friends.

Activities continued after our return, with meetings to share photos, to eat more Thai food, and to prepare photo books of our experience.

Julie is offering the your again this year, and also a new tour to Laos, a country that is equally beautiful but much less developed than Thailand.

(* Please excuse my spelling of Thai names. The Thai alphabet is completely incomprehensible to me, and Thai names are transcribed into English apparently randomly, as the same name appears in different spelling at every occurrence.

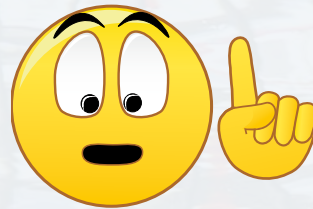
